Mr. Mattias Sundholm

Deputy Spokesperson / Deputy Head of Press & Public Diplomacy Delegation of the European Union to the U.S. in Washington D.C.

Mattias Sundholm has been the Deputy Spokesman for the European Commission Delegation to the US, Washington, DC, since September 2006. He is also the Deputy Head of the Delegation's Press and Public Diplomacy Section charged with promoting the EU's positions and policies throughout the United States.

From 2002 to 2004, Sundholm worked as a Swedish diplomat serving with the Swedish Ministry of Foreign Affairs. He worked as Spokesperson for the Ministry and as Desk Officer for the Western Balkans. In the latter capacity, he was briefly posted to the Embassy of Sweden in Sarajevo (Bosnia and Herzegovina). He was also posted to Zimbabwe as Second Secretary at the Embassy of Sweden in Harare, where he was reporting on political and economic issues, including media, parliamentary affairs and the controversial land reform.

Furthermore, he has worked as a consultant for French consultancy firm *FI System*, based in Brussels--and focused on European Affairs and public relations--and for three years as a journalist for Scandinavia's biggest daily in print and on the web: *Aftonbladet*.

Sundholm has an M.Sc. in Political Science from Uppsala University and the Institut

Sundholm has an M.Sc. in Political Science from Uppsala University and the Institut d'études politiques (Sciences-Po) in Paris, and an M.A. degree in European Political and Administrative Studies from the College of Europe in Bruges (Belgium). He is fluent in Swedish, English and French.
