Dr. Shireen T. Hunter is a Visiting Professor at Georgetown University and Distinguished Scholar at the Center for Strategic and International Studies (CSIS) in Washington, D.C., where she was Deputy Director of the Middle East Program, 1983-92. From 1993-97, she was Visiting Senior Fellow at the Centre for European Policy Studies (CEPS) in Brussels, and also directed CEPS' Mediterranean Program. Prior to joining CSIS, Dr. Hunter was Guest Scholar at the Brookings Institution and Research Fellow at the Harvard University Center for International Affairs (CFIA). Dr. Hunter is a member of the Council on Foreign Relations.

A leading and internationally known authority on Iran and international relations of Islam, Dr. Hunter is author of many books, including *Iran's Foreign Policy in the Post-Soviet Era: Resisting the New International Order* (2010), *Islam in Russia: The Politics of Identity and Security*, with Jeffrey Thomas and Alexander Melikishvili (2004), *Islam and Human Rights: Advancing a US-Muslim Dialogue*, ed. (2005), *Islam: Europe's Second Religion*, ed. (2002), *The Future of Islam and the West: Clash of Civilizations or Peaceful Coexistence?* (1998), *Central Asia since Independence* (1996), and, *Iran After Khomeini* (1992). In addition she has written over 30 book chapters in edited volumes and 40 articles in many leading journals such as *Foreign Affairs*, *Foreign Policy*, *Current History*, and the *Middle East Journal*, as well as in prominent newspapers. She holds a Ph.D. in political science from the Graduate Institute of International Studies in Geneva, an M.A. from the London School of Economics and Political Science, and a BA from the University of Tehran.
