The play **Bonsoir Monsieur Chopin** is a musical drama aimed at creating a closer acquaintance with the works of the composer and with the sources of his artistic inspiration. Frédéric (Fryderyk) Chopin was not only a distinguished pianist and composer, he was also a fascinating human being. He left his homeland, Poland, for France at barely 20 years old, but he had already become a success as a fully accomplished artist. In Poland, Chopin received an excellent education as a student of the Warsaw Conservatoire. His talent, passion, and an extremely diligent work ethic opened the doors of musical salons and prestigious concert halls in Paris and other European cities within a short time.

On October 17, 1849, the great Chopin died at the age of 39. This day remains one of special significance to Poles. He suffered towards the end of his life and never lost the longing for Poland. He left a week before the 1830 November Uprising that crushed Poland and forced it to remain in exile. Nonetheless, Chopin and his music lives on in the hearts and minds of Polonia around the world, and his piano compositions are some of the most beautiful and popular ever played and heard.

Throughout Bonsoir, Monsieur Chopin, poems by several reknowned Polish poets are used: The Magic Piano by J. Zajączkowski, The Meeting with Chopin by Konstanty Ildefons Gałczyński, Żelazowa Wola and Etudes by Roman Brandstaetter, He is the One by Kornel Makuszyński, Chopin's Concert by Artur Oppman, and Chopin's Motherland by Stanisław Bagiński.





Maria Nowotarska graduated from the Academy for the Dramatic Arts in Krakow, Poland and performed under the direction of most of the renowned theatrical directors. She also appeared in a number of films and TV productions. After emigrating to Toronto, Canada in 1990, she co-founded "The Salon of Poetry, Music and Theatre." Collaborating with Kazimierz Braun and her daughter, Agata Pilitowska, they have presented many original plays about celebrated Polish women, including actress Helena Modrzejewska, artist Tamara Lempicka, and singer and actress Pola Negri. She also

created an Actors' Studio to introduce young people of Polish origin to the stage. She has received awards for her contributions to the Polish arts: the Medal of Polish Senate, Cross of Merit by the President of the Republic of Poland, "Gloria Artis" medal, "Distinguished Advocate of Polish Culture" title by the Polish Minister of Culture and National Heritage, and the Gold Medal from the American Institute of Polish Culture, Miami, in 2011. In 2013, Ms. Nowotarska and Ms. Pilitowska performed the play, *Radiation* about Marie Sklodowska Curie, at FIU as part of the Blanka Rosenstiel Lecture Series on Poland.



Agata Pilitowska, a graduate of the Krakow School of Drama, has portrayed many famous and accomplished Polish women in over 100 stage productions throughout North America, South America and Europe. Her successful collaboration with her mother, Maria Nowotarska and Kazimierz Braun in "The Salon of Poetry, Music and Theatre" in Toronto, Canada has earned her widespread acclaim and recognition. Her artistic achievements have been honored with the title of "Merited for Polish Culture"

conferred by the Polish Government, and in 2006 she received the prestigious medal "Gloria Artis" from the Minister of Culture and the National Heritage of Poland along with her mother.

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
