Join us for a discussion with Dr. Emily Greble, who will explore the contradictions of race, religion, and politics in multi-confessional areas of Hitler's Europe. Greble will shed light on how and why Muslims in Bosnia simultaneously supported Hitler's Third Reich and actively protected Jews from genocide, and in the process discuss the ethics of researching such a contentious topic.

**Emily Greble** is Associate Professor of History, Russian and East European Studies, Jewish Studies, and European Studies at Vanderbilt University. Her first book, *Sarajevo, 1941-1945: Muslims, Christians, and Jews in Hitler's Europe* (Cornell, 2011) examines the persistence of institutions and networks in the city of Sarajevo under Nazi occupation during the Second World War. She is currently writing a history of Muslims in the post-Ottoman Balkans.
